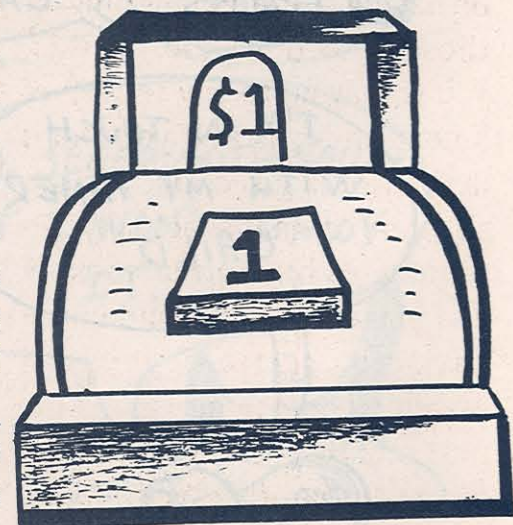

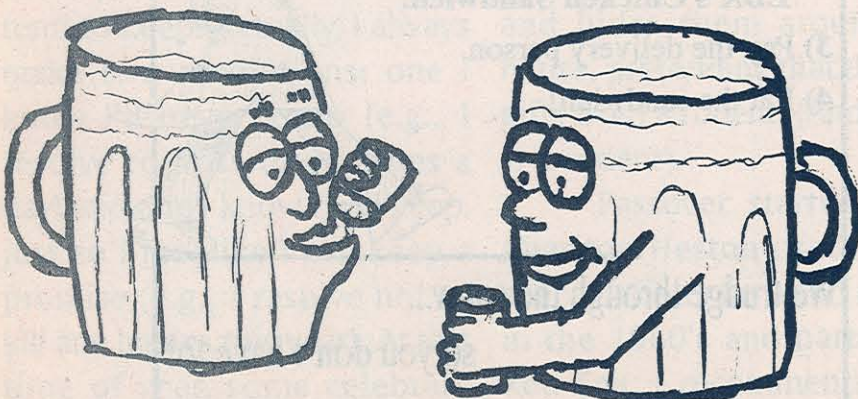
- 1) anyone is dressed in polyester.

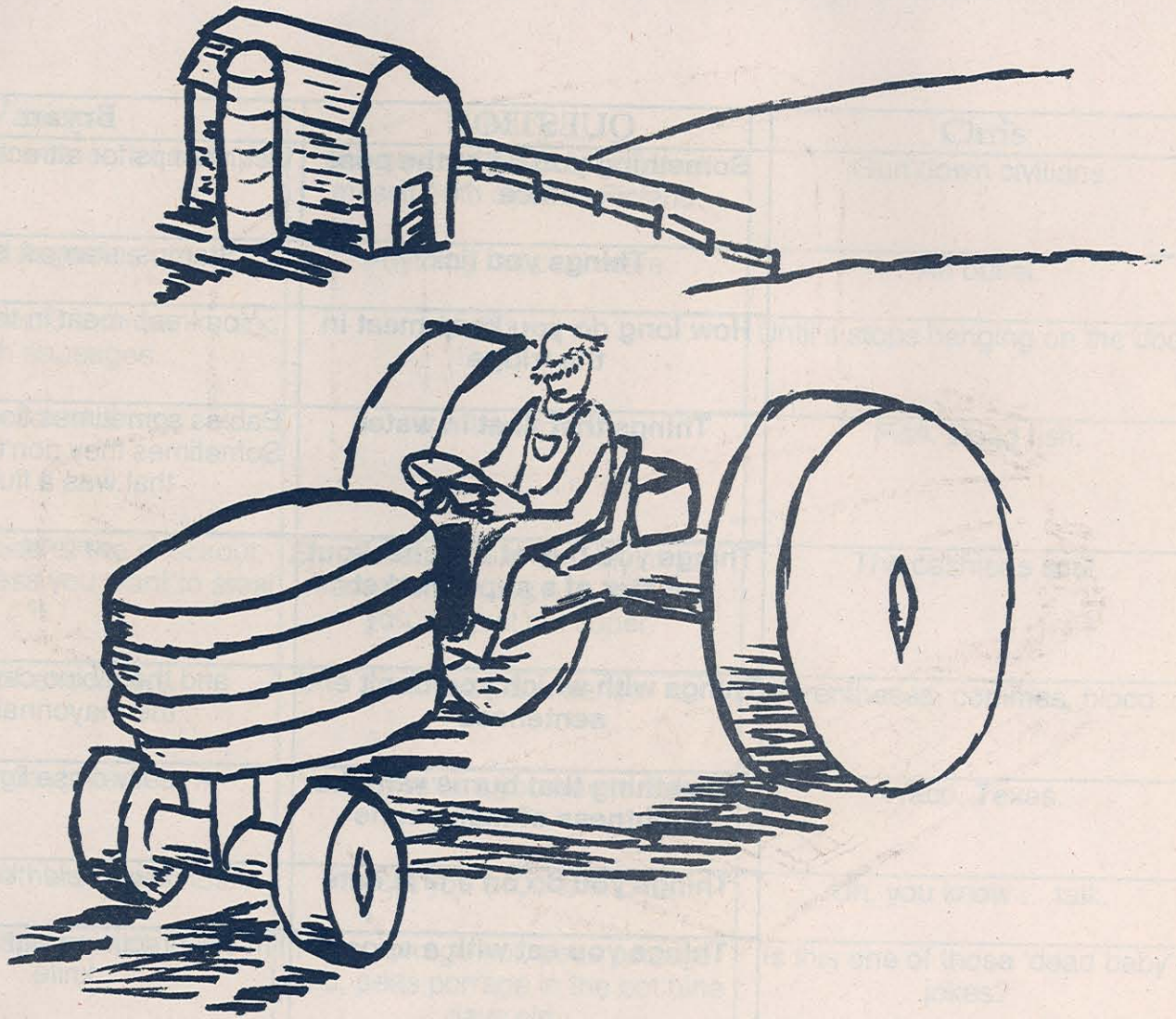
